LETTER FROM THE CHAIR AND THE EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT



The ACP Foundation continues to create innovative programs and materials aimed at improving patients' understanding of their health. Increased media coverage of the Foundation's work is a sign of our heightened visibility as a leader in health literacy. During the past year, media mentions of the ACP Foundation increased to 55 million potential viewers/readers.

During the 2007-2008 fiscal year, the ACP Foundation reached out to several health organizations in order to create the most effective patient materials possible. Partnerships with the Arthritis Foundation, the University of Pennsylvania Center for Population Health and Health Disparities, and the National Osteoporosis Foundation led to the development of content for HEALTH TiPS on Rheumatoid Arthritis, Prostate Cancer Screening and Osteoporosis. HEALTH TiPS are created specifically to help patients understand what they need to know and do to manage their health, and to improve physician-patient communication. This past year saw the launch of five new HEALTH TiPS: Prostate Cancer Screening, Rheumatoid Arthritis, Osteoporosis, High Cholesterol, and Depression.

2007-2008 was the first full year of release of the ACP Foundation's diabetes self-management guide *Living with Diabetes: An Everyday Guide for you and Your Family*. The guide has continued to be a great success with patients and clinicians. In a recent survey sent out to clinicians who ordered the guide, 97% of clinicians that responded stated that they believe their patients who use the guide are managing their diabetes better than before they were given the guide. Citing the success of the diabetes guide, the Board of Trustees approved funding to begin the production of a second guide, *Living with COPD: An Everyday Guide for You and Your Family*. The COPD guide builds on the success of the diabetes guide, using a similar format, following health literacy principles, and focusing on self-management. The COPD guide is currently under development and will be released in 2009.

This year many new national organizations utilized the patient materials created by the ACP Foundation. Government agencies such as State Medicaid Programs, the Veterans Administration and Indian Health Services, large corporations such as JPMorgan and BP of America, and health plans such as CIGNA and Blue Cross/Blue Shield have all ordered ACP Foundation HEALTH TiPS or Diabetes Guides.

The 7th Annual Health Communication Conference will take place on November 19, 2008 at the Institute of Medicine in Washington DC. The conference provides a stage for health literacy experts to share their research and proven interventions to improve communication with patients about their health. Keynote speakers at the conference will include Janet Corrigan, PhD, MBA, President and CEO of the National Quality Forum, and Karen Ignagni, MBA, President and CEO of America's Health Insurance Plans. The conference will also convene four workshops: The Impact of Health Literacy on Health Care Quality, System Redesign to Provide Health Literacy Sensitive Clinical Care, Health Literacy Interventions in Health Systems, and Medication Label

Improvement: An Issue at the Intersection of Health Literacy and Patient Safety. The Medication Labeling workshop will bring together stakeholders from agencies such as the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy (NABP), Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ), United States Pharmacopeia, Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The ACP Foundation continues its efforts to explore the connection between health literacy and prescription bottle labeling.

Through partnering with other organizations and insisting on only the highest quality of products, we are proud to say that the ACP Foundation has further established itself as a leader in the health literacy arena.

MISSION

Improve the health and welfare of patients and society through initiatives that provide patients with the information they need to understand and manage their health.

GOALS

In partnership with ACP and others:

- I. Develop and implement patient-centered and systems-oriented programs to improve health communication and health outcomes;
- II. Promote research and programs that allow patients to be active participants to understand, manage, and improve their health;

PROGRAM STRATEGIES: PATIENT-CENTERED HEALTH LITERACY INITIATIVE

Now in its seventh year, the ACP Foundation's Health Communication Initiative continues to move forward with new patient-centered health literacy programs designed specifically for the 90 million Americans who have difficulty understanding and acting upon health information. The ACP Foundation's health literacy programs will help combat this problem through enhancing the quality of health care by improving communication with patients, and removing cultural and language barriers.

Health Literacy

"The degree to which individuals have the capacity to obtain, process, and understand basic health information and services needed to make appropriate decisions."

Sixth Annual National Health Communication Conference – Advances in Health Literacy

The ACP Foundation convened its Sixth Annual National Health Communication Conference, *Advances in Health Literacy*, on November 28, 2007. This year's conference showed an increased number of health literacy panel presentations, which focused on successful models that will improve health outcomes among patients with low health literacy. Attendees represented a wide array of organizations, including academia, medicine, large employers, pharmaceuticals, media, health insurance, patient advocacy, and government.

Conference speakers included representatives of the Institute of Medicine (IOM), Literacy Assistance Center in New York, the New York Times, State of the Art, Inc., Symphony Capital, LLC and several universities and medical schools. Presentations included:

- What Needs to be Done to Introduce Change in Health Literacy
- Literacy Community Centers and Health Literacy
- Six Panel Presentations on Health Literacy Interventions
- Health Literacy for Doctors: How to use Physician Practices to Help Patients Understand Health Information

- Health Literacy and the Media
- Prescription Bottle Labeling as a Means to Improve Patient Care

HEALTH TiPS – WHAT YOU CAN DO©

This past year saw the launch of six new HEALTH TiPS topics including: Depression, Flu, High Cholesterol, Osteoporosis, Prostate Cancer Screening, Rheumatoid Arthritis. To date, approximately 25,000,000 sheets have been ordered by ACP members and other organizations. This year the Foundation began surveying the clinicians who are using HEALTH TiPS. Survey results indicate the following:

- 92% state that HEALTH TiPS save them time in explaining health issues to their patients.
- 99% state their patients appreciate receiving HEALTH TiPS.
- 28% of the physicians stated their patients referred to a HEALTH TiPS in a subsequent visit.

PATIENT SELF-MANAGEMENT GUIDES

The *Living with Diabetes: An Everyday Guide for You and Your Family* now has over 800,000 copies in circulation among ACP and non-ACP members, allied health professionals and various leading organization and medical centers. Following is a sample of the organizations ordering the guide:

This year the Foundation began surveying the clinicians who are using the guide. Survey results indicate the following:

- 97% state that they believe their patients who use the guide are managing their diabetes better than before they were given the guide.
- 93% state that using the guide saves time in explaining how to manage diabetes.
- 88% of the clinicians have referred the guide to other health professionals.

The development of a Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) self-management guide began in the spring of 2008. The same team that developed the diabetes guide is leading the development of the COPD guide with the addition of a pulmonologist and a smoking cessation expert. This guide will teach practical self-management skills and will motivate patients to modify their lifestyle and stop smoking. It will also encourage patients to seek support and offer strategies for setting achievable goals.

MEDICATION LABELING PROJECT

The ACP Foundation continued to move forward with the Medication Labeling Project. On October 12, 2007, the ACP Foundation's White Paper, Improving Prescription Drug Container Labeling in the United States: A Health Literacy and Medication Safety Initiative, was presented at the Institute of Medicine (IOM) Roundtable on Health Literacy. The paper highlighted the problems of patients misunderstanding medication dosing instructions and called for improvements. Dr. Alastair Wood introduced the Uniform Medication Schedule (UMS) for standardizing dosing instructions and engaged the five panels in discussions on using the UMS. Support was indicated for both the white paper and the concept of a more standardized dosing schedule for prescription container labels by the national stakeholders including:

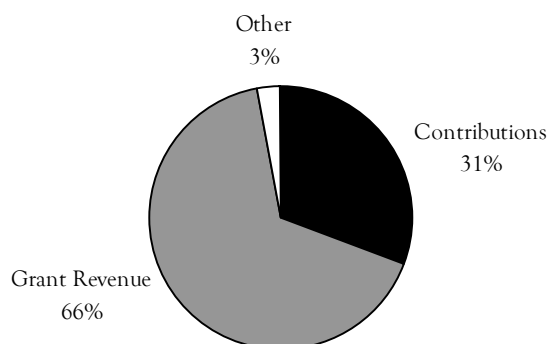

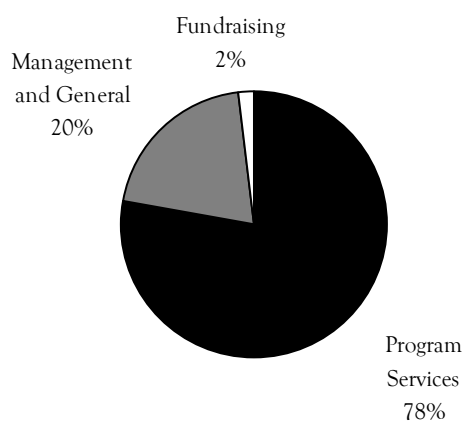
